Ribbon cutting ceremony celebrates new production line, reductions in water usage

A \$4.5-million invest-ment into Ecolab's Huntington plant has brought a few new changes to production machinery recently, bringing members of the Huntington Economic Development team, leaders from the city and county and Ecolab team leaders together for a commissioning of the new operations.

Ecolab, a global company that has been operational in one form or another in Huntington since 1919, announced plans of working toward two projects in April 2018. Eric Bricker,

Huntington plant manager, explained that the first one was a new system to wash out equipment in a way that reduces the amount of water used.

Bricker said with this new system, they are able to reduce the amount of water used by 25 percent.

"Typically our goal in an average year is 3, 4, 5 percent to get better every year as far as sustainability. This is huge leap forward with about a 25 percent total reduction in the water usage for this plant and for the community," Bricker said. Secondly, the plant was able to install a new bag

line which fills bagged soap. Bricker said they targeted a specific business to pick it up and ended up attracting two realtors Walmart and Sam's Club.

"One of the exciting

things about this is with the Walmart contract, we now make all of the soap for every single Walmart in the United States that

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goes into their restrooms," Bricker said. "So whether it's Maine or Texas or Florida or Indiana - every time you use a restroom in Walmart, it's Huntington soap, which is pretty cool."

In a past press release, Indiana Secretary of Commerce Jim Schellinger explained that through this upgrade and continued investment in new machinery, Ecolab will be able to expand its manufacturing presence which will in turn continue to support jobs in the community.
