in our current market," Wickersham said.

The overall unemployment rate within the county dropped by around 1.5 percent since January 2019 from 4.4 percent to just under 3 percent.

HCUED's business planning activities for the coming vear include business retention and expansion activities, attraction activities, industrial site preparation, continued work with Northeast Indiana Regional Partnership, continued support and collaborative effort with the Huntington County Learning Center, the Huntington County Redevelopment Commission, and continued corporate outreach efforts.
